In each class a rosette will be awarded by Sport Horse Breeding of Great Britain to the owner of the highest placed horse sired by a SHB (GB) Graded Stallion, provided it finishes in the top 10 places.

In each class a rosette will be awarded by British Breeding to the Owner and the Breeder of the highest placed British bred horse, providing it finishes in the top ten places.

The Henson Challenge Cup

Awarded to the Five Year Old Champion

The Alwyn Varley Memorial Trophy

Awarded to the Highest placed owner who is also the breeder in the Four Year Old Final

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Dressage Phase (30 marks)

Unlike a normal dressage test, combinations are not assessed on the current state of training and marks are not given for individual movements.

The idea is to find horses with three correct, scopey and regular gaits, whilst considering the attributes for potential longevity and performance as a world class event horse.

Assessment of individual tasks:

Trot (5) - Rhythm, looseness, suppleness, winging back, potential ability to engage the hindquarters.

Walk (5) - Rhythm, relaxation, activity, ground cover.

Canter (5) - Rhythm, looseness, suppleness, natural balance, uphill tendency, potential ability to engage the hindquarters.

Rideability (5) - according to the age and stage of training and reaction to the aids.

Suitability (10) - Aptitude as a young event horse and potential to make a world class event horse.

Jumping Phase (40 marks)

NO time will be allowed between sections for any adjustment to tack or rider's dress.

Maximum height of fences:

4 year olds - 1.00m

5 year olds - 1.10m

Fall of horse or rider or a total of 3 refusals will result in elimination.

Judges are looking for a bold athletic horse with good technique. A horse with these qualities, should not necessarily be penalised for knocking down one fence (or a four-year-old having one refusal), providing they demonstrate they react positively afterwards. Especially in the early part of the season, four-year-olds may find it easier to jump some fences out of trot.

Technique, Balance & Rideability/Temperament (25) - The horses desire to be careful over a fence taking into account the natural technique (of limbs and body) appropriate for a world class event horse. Natural balance and general athleticism/agility. (Quickness of the footwork and lightness of landing). Rideability indicated by general attitude, reaction to riders aids.

Suitability (15) - Suitability, type to include scope and range of movement to indicate potential to be a future world class event horse that is capable of getting the time around a Championship five star track.

Suitability & Type (20 marks)

Judges are looking for horses with the attributes to withstand the demands of the sport in terms of soundness, speed and stamina. Lack of quality and other defects which might indicate limited stamina or speed should be penalised, even though the horse may be a nice dressage or show jumping prospect.

Potential to Gallop (10 marks)

The top 10 horses after the first three phases only, are required to come forward



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Conditions

- 1. Horses must exceed 148cm without shoes.
- 2. Age: Open to horses born in 2019 and 2020.
- 3. Only horses that have qualified at one of the official Burghley Young Event Horse Qualifiers are eligible for the final.
- 4. Saddlery: (warm-up and competition): tack as per British Eventing Rules for Novice Dressage snaffle bridle only, see website www.britisheventing.com. Running martingale only and front boots are optional for sections I, II and III.

 However, NO hind boots or bandages of any kind may be worn in the collecting ring, warm-up area or actual class.

 Jumping whip only allowed (max length 75cm).
- 5. Dress: As for British Eventing Novice Dressage Test/Hunting Dress. British Eventing/BHS approved hat and harness to be worn for all sections.
- 6. Entries Open: Monday 22 July 2024
- 7. Close of Entries: 8 August 2024 for ALL qualifiers being held before this date.
- 8. Withdrawals are to be made by 17.00 on Friday 30th August via email to holly.farr@burghley.co.uk or by telephone 01780 484502
- 9. Starting Times will be available after 17.00 on Monday 2nd September via burghley-horse.co.uk
- 10. Admission: each entry will receive one Friday Horsebox vehicle pass. In addition 2 Friday admission tickets and 1 Friday public car park pass will be issued for ONE owner (email required at time of entry). No cars will be allowed to park in the Horsebox Park. Any vehicle coming without the appropriate pass will be charged the daily rate. Horses must not be left unattended in the horsebox park.
- 11. Vaccinations: Horses must have been vaccinated to comply with Burghley Horse Trials requirements of a primary course (1st vaccination and then 2nd vaccination between 21-92 days later), followed by the first booster (150-215 days) and all subsequent boosters. Horses may compete having received the primary course and prior to the first booster but not within 7 days of receiving a vaccine dose. Horses must have been vaccinated within 6 months before the 1st September but not less than 7 days of arriving at the show. Random checks will be carried out at the Event and we urge all owners to adhere to strict biosecurity protocols at all times.
- 12. Stabling: There is no stabling available onsite. Please contact the Horse Trials Office for other stabling options.
- 13. Conflict of Interest: Within the equestrian community there may be times when conflicts occur. For guidance, it has been determined that a perceived/potential conflict of interest could arise in the event that an appointed judge has a previous or current connection to a horse entered in the competition. Examples of such connections and interests include, but not limited to, the following. The judge has; bred or previously owned the horse or acted as an agent in its sale; previously competed, trained or kept the horse at livery; previously or currently had a financial or other interest in the horse. In the event that a judge/owner/rider (or their agent) knows of, or should know of, any potential and/or perceived conflict of interest in a horse entered in the competition they must declare this to the Organiser as soon as it is known. Steps will be taken to manage it as practically as possible. Any potential conflicts will be written and displayed next to the scoreboard. Conflicts at the Final will be avoided and managed by Burghley Horse Trials.
- 14. It is a condition of entry that all riders, owners, grooms, and their connections/relatives, must conduct themselves and communicate in a respectful manner towards the public, officials, and all other parties present or entered in the competition. Such behaviour includes respect for the Judges and their decisions, which are final. Offensive behaviour, and/or other violations of this condition, may lead to sanctions such as disqualification and future bans.
